GENERAL DESCRIPTION

The northern half of T. 2 N., R. 36 E., contains a great variety of land. On some of the high plateaus, there are great stretches of first class arable land; other parts are rough and mountainous. The entire region is covered with a nutritious growth of bunch grass. The township affords a fine range for cattle, horses and sheep. In sections 1, 2 and 11, there are several large watering troughs. The largest area of arable land is found in sections 1, 11, 12 and 14. This is fine body of land and if cleared, would produce good crops. There are several good patches of pine and fir timber. Sections 1, 11, 12 and 15 contain the best timber. Scattering clumps of fir, tamarack and pine are found in most every section. The township is well watered. Meacham drains the western part, while the tributaries of the Umatilla River reach far back into the interior. Rine and Line Creeks run through the central part. There are several large springs in sections 1, 11, 14 and 15.
