	<p>This T. is rolling with level land near the Wild Horse Creek. The soil is a rich sandy loam, and produces splendid grain. There is no timber, excepting a fine body of cotton wood, known as "The Grove" in Sec. 34 &amp; some scattering cottonwood along the Wild Horse Creek.</p>

	<p>The lands in this Tp. are well adapted to stock raising being well covered with the very best of bunch grass, Wild Horse Creek runs through the S.E. Cor. furnishing the only watering places.</p>	
	<p>Timber is very scarce being confined to a narrow lining on the banks of the stream, consisting of Balm and Willow.</p>	
	<p>All of that portion on the S. side of Wild Horse Creek is situated on the Umatilla Indian Reservation, the creek being the boundary line on the N.</p>	
	<p>I apprehend there will be some difficulty in arranging the Bdy. line bet. the Reservation and Claimants along the Creek, on the N. side, since all the agricultural lands in the Tp. are immediately on the banks of the creek.</p>	
	<p>The creek, is serpentine in its course, diagonally cutting the survey, making it out of the question to secure to the claimants, all of the rich lands along the stream by legal subdivisions, without trespassing upon the Reservation.</p>
