

Subdivisional Lines, T.4 S.,R.33 E.,W.M.

Chains.

General Description.

This Township is an elevated plateau, part broken, part rolling, part level, much the larger part undulating. Greater part of the soil is second rate and large part of it is adapted to agriculture, large part is 3rd rate & a small part is first rate.

About three-fourths is covered with timber, about one-fourth is open, but consists of small open glades, except in creek bottom in S. part, which is sufficiently large to be called prairies.

It is well watered and much of it will be settled at an early day.

Note:

The applicant who asked the survey of this Township, does not live in it, but in the Township directly S. and his improvement is on N. $\frac{1}{2}$ of Sec.2, T.5 S.,R.33 E., which should also be subdivided.

I would have substituted this Township; viz.- 5 S.R.33 E. for 4 S.,R.33 E., but it is my judgement that both should be subdivided.

There is no doubt, there would now be quite a number of settlers in each of these Tps., except for the fact that a man named Bowman claims a large tract as State swamp land, which it is not, and by making improvements such as fencing and building cabins and making threats, he has prevented all except R.H.Redman and a Mr.Laman from making any attempt at settlement.

T.5 S.,R.33 E. should also be subdivided at an early day.

Robert H. Redman, who made application for the survey of this Tp., as well as myself, supposed that he lived in it, but upon running the exteriors, his claim was found to be just S. of the line in the next Tp.
